Choreographers and Guest Artists

Stephanie Cox (4th Year, Biology, Dance Minor): *Dance with Me*, Fall 2015 Dance Concert (UVA Drama). In my piece, *Pins and Needles*, we explored the fear and feeling of losing control of your own body. I challenged my dancers to utilize their own inhibitions and embrace the uncomfortable.

Elyssa Fonicello (3rd Year, Public Policy and Leadership, Dance Minor): *Diffident Direction*, Fall 2015 Dance Concert (UVA Drama). My piece, *Under Paper and Glue*, explores the influence of shared memory and experiences on the understanding of a person's life after their death.

Mona Kasra is an Assistant Professor of Digital Media Design at the University of Virginia. A cross-disciplinary scholar and a creative practitioner, she employs, explores, and experiments with existing and emerging media to enhance the concepts of narrative and performative arts. She received her Ph.D. in Arts and Technology, with a focus in emerging media & communication, from the University of Texas at Dallas. She holds an M.F.A. in video/digital art and a B.A. in Visual Communication and Design. Mona currently serves as Conference Chair at ACM SIGGRAPH 2016, undertaking an engaged role in the strategic planning, leading, and managing of the world's largest, most influential annual conference on the theory and practice of computer graphics and interactive techniques.

Caroline Korndorffer (2nd Year, Political Philosophy, Policy, and Law): My piece *Acatalepsy* is an investigation of the moments that make us human, in particular, the way we handle the incomprehensibility of varying experiences. This piece was created in collaboration with my dancers, the poet, and the composer.

Kim Brooks Mata is the Head and Artistic Director of the Dance Program at the University of Virginia and is on faculty in the Integrated Movement Studies Certification program. She has studied dance at Codarts in the Netherlands and at the University of Utah where she received her M.F.A. in Modern Dance. Her work is grounded in the exploration of the concept of identity through the moving body and the construction, deconstruction, and manifestation of Self through dance performance and choreography. She is the recipient of various grants, most recently the inaugural Arts Endowment grant which she received with colleagues Mona Kasra and Kristina Warren. This grant enabled the creation of this multidisciplinary collaborative piece that investigates issues surrounding the perception, construction, and projection of Self through live dance and digital media performance.

Sri Devi McCabe (4th Year, Drama, Dance Minor): *Those who cannot obey themselves will be commanded* is a look at control and the relationship it has with perspective. Control in any given situation can be quite relative to the perspective you are looking at it from. If you give control over to someone is it the same as if it were taken? Are you in someway still in control?

Aqura Russell (5th Year, Chemical Engineering, Dance Minor): As One, Fall 2014 Experimental Dance Concert (UVA Drama). Naked Eye was inspired by the socially constructed gaze on the female body. This piece explores the voice of one's body from the inside out.

Katie Baer Schetlick is a dance artist, researcher, and current Lecturer in Dance at the University of Virginia. Her choreographic work has been presented at numerous venues in New York City as well as international venues in the Netherlands, Poland, Brazil, and Egypt. Together with Zena Bibler, Katie is the

co-founder of the Movement Party and the Fleet Moves Dance Festival. She holds a M.A. in Performance Studies from New York University and a B.F.A. in Dance with a minor in Anthropology from the Ailey/Fordham B.F.A. program.

This semester I experienced two stirring moments somewhat simultaneously-- a collision with the writings of Annie Dillard and the passing of my composition teacher and mentor, Kazuko Hirabayashi. As a result of this, and everything my collaborators have so generously shared, *"I'm bony and dense."* is a compositional study of "the uncertainty of vision, the horror of the fixed, the dissolution with the present, the intricacy of beauty, the pressure of fecundity, the elusiveness of the free, and the flawed nature of perfection." These words by Dillard on "all that providence implies," for me, encapsulate what every dance aspires to and I think Kazuko would agree.

Brad Stoller (UVA M.F.A. Drama '02) directs the theatre program at PVCC and teaches dance at UVA. Brad is a certified Alexander Technique teacher and teaches workshops around the U.S., Canada, Europe, and Africa using dance, theatre, and improvisation.

The piece is an exploration of support, the way we can support each other in our individual story without becoming lost, or sometimes losing our own story. My interest is in using contact improvisation that is such a fluid and melding form in combination with an improvisational approach that honors our separate realities. This group has been a particularly satisfying experience with members who are both actors and dancers and unafraid of the human voice and taking risks.

Sage Tanguay (4th Year, Drama, Dance Minor): *#unspired*, Fall Dance Concert 2015; *2B: her*, Spring Dance Concert 2015; *Ca va?*, Fall Experimental Concert 2014; *Prompera*, Spring 2014 Dance Concert; *O, the confines of a box*, Fall Experimental Dance Concert 2013 (UVA Drama); *Five-Slided Projection*, Winter Concert 2012 (Community Dance Connection Theatre). *carouself-inflicted* is an exploration of indulgent, insidious, inescapable nostalgia and the garish illusions of carousels.

Musicians/Composers

Christopher Benos is a rising 3rd year majoring in Honors Politics and French. He has studied piano performance and composition for over ten years, and is the Program Director for Music Youth Mentoring for Madison House. His piece, *Reverie*, was created as an improvisational piece that could mimic the movement of dancers on waves of sound.

Mecca Burns is a drama therapist, theatre activist, and musician. She is a founding member of Presence Center for Applied Theatre Arts, based in Charlottesville, Virginia, applying the arts for personal and social transformation. She leads (and writes about) participatory theatre projects in Uganda, Kenya, Spain, Romania, and the U.S.A. **Will Mullany** is a 4th year composer, audio producer, and intermedia artist. His work generally involves straddling acoustic sound, digital processing, and found sample material.

Eli Stine is a composer, programmer, and media designer currently studying as a Jefferson Fellow in the Composition and Computer Technologies Ph.D. program at University of Virginia. Stine's artistic output includes electroacoustic and acoustic music, and frequently incorporates multimedia technologies and collaboration. Performances include the International Computer Music Conference, SEAMUS conferences, Conference on New Interfaces for Musical Expression, New York City Electroacoustic Music, Third Practice, Studio 300, and Threshold festivals, the Muestra Internacional de Música Electroacústica, and the International Sound Art Festival Berlin. His work has been published by the International Computer Music Association. More information and work can be found at <u>www.elistine.com</u>.

Kristina Warren (4th year Ph.D. Music, Composition & Computer Technologies) is a composer, improviser, and Ph.D. student in Composition & Computer Technologies at UVA. Her sound art explores choice, process, communication, and time. Warren's work has been presented at conferences including the International Computer Music Conference, and in 2016 she was named an Associate Artist at the Atlantic Center for the Arts.
