DIRECTOR'S NOTES

Shakespeare wrote the *The Two Gentlemen of Verona* sometime before 1598, when it appears in a published list of his plays. The exact date is unknown, but the general belief is that the date of its writing and first performance falls somewhere in the early 1590s. The only printed edition from the time period appears in the First Folio of 1623, the first collection of Shakespeare's plays. As source material, Shakespeare drew from a Spanish tale, *Diana Enamorada*, which was also the basis for a lost English play *The History of Felix and Philomena* (1585).

The Two Gentlemen of Verona is a romantic comedy about young love. The word love is used over 131 times in the play—20 times in the first scene alone. The play begins with Valentine and Proteus, best friends since...forever...at a delicate moment in their lives and their friendship. Valentine is leaving Verona for Milan to see, as he puts it, "the wonders of the world." Proteus, hopelessly in love with Julia, stays behind in Verona, to Valentine's dismay. The friendship between Valentine and Proteus is put to the test when they both fall in love with the same woman—Silvia. In the name of love, Proteus finds himself betraying both his betrothed Julia and his friend Valentine.

The play has everything needed for a good comedy—witty exchanges, physical slapstick, gender-disguise, and even a dog. It certainly invites us to laugh at the absurd behavior often demonstrated by those in love. It also, however, points out the complications and cost of love. This is a play about the life-changing mistakes we make with our friends, family, and lovers: the bad ones, the brutal ones; the ever-remembered-with-pain ones. It is, in short, a story about growing up and realizing that our actions create our character. In this play, both "gentlemen" live up to their character names. Valentine, whole-heartedly constant in friendship and love; Proteus, well, his name means "changeable"...
